Onto the on-field stuff – thanks to all the captains for your efforts in leading teams. We managed to avoid any off field mycricket fines – keeping Mad Dog happy. We probably didn't have the success we were looking for but still ended with two flags which is a great achievement. Well done Bakes' Colts for winning the flag – it does show the youth at the club is strong and numbers wise we could have filled two sides – so I think the future is bright at the ACC. Bakes has been huge in the recruiting side of things – a massive help and the club is such a better place now because of it. Also, well done Scala's 7th grade for knocking off the undefeated Freo Mossie Park in the grand final. A truly remarkable effort to defend 113 against such a strong team.

We hadn't done this day for the past few years – mainly because of timing and the difficulty of doing too many events. But it was good to have this back on the calendar as it is something that gives back to the members and charity. Also, we had our first ever mixed game as the lead up to the match, with the girls probably outshining the guys. Then we had Presentation night – again with over 100 people attending – a massive night which was highlighted by Life Membership being awarded to Cheese. Definitely the best presentation night I have been to – so thanks to everyone who chipped in for each of the events - I think it's what makes our club special.

Unfortunately for the first time in many years we didn't do the auction night (the club's biggest fundraiser) so we will endeavour to run this early next season as it is something we don't want to let die off.

Finally, I would like to say that I will be stepping down from the Presidency come the AGM – but will still remain involved on the committee. Time for fresh ideas, as we move into a crucial time for the club. I think numbers / age demographic wise we are in the strongest position we have been in my time at the club. Time to take advantage of that and become the strongest club in the association. ACC TREASURERS REPORT

On behalf of the committee and the club, we would like to say a big thank you to the above sponsors. Without them, we simply would not be able to operate as a club.

Firstly, I would like to make a special mention to Murray Sutherland for the operating the canteen again for the year. Murray's contribution from the canteen was \$1,549 and on behalf of the committee and the club, we would like to thank Murray for his tireless efforts throughout the year.

The 2018/19 year was unfortunately not a good one financially. We again recorded a net loss of the year of \$7,399 (2017/18: Loss of \$16,189.) Given the previous years development of Bert Jeffrey, the club has incurred some significant expenses over the last couple of years. Following this year and prior year losses, we have used all retained earnings and a miserly cash reserve. In summary, we cannot continue to operate at a loss in the manner we are.

Our bar traded at a profit of \$7,752 (2017/18 \$20,838) although did not perform as well as 2017/18. Taking into account we did proceed with an auction night (\$8k profit of items in 2017/18) and did not "Chase the cheese." (\$2k in 2017/18) Inevitably, leading to a lower bar turnover. Our functions such as AFL Grand final day, beer pong and the quiz night continue to be a good income generator, along with a great night at the club. Thanks to all involved in organising these events.

The ladies cricket teams carried out a Bunnings "sausage sizzle" which was a great idea and also a great success. This raised just over \$1k (\$1,016 to be exact). Great job girls!

Player/member fees were on par with last year, which was a record year at the club. Albeit, there are still members who still do not fulfil their fee obligations, even with numerous reminders. Having two girls teams also helped with fees. As everyone is aware, we introduced "play per game" option this year which helped with cashflow. This proved a success, providing different platforms for players to make the required payments. Thank you to all the captains who embraced the new system and recorded/chased fee payments. Our turf facility costs were an issue last year due to variable unknown costs. This has been rectified by the committee during the 2018/19 year. Player uniforms/apparel was a significantly higher this year, which will be significantly lower in the next year. Costs for T20 shirts (which were supposed to be paid by players) were not recouped to cover the cost price for the shirts. Again, something that could potentially be looked at. Although, T20 shirts will not be needed for a couple of years.

In summary, the committee have a lot of work in front of them for the 2019/20 year if we are to continue to operate as a cricket club. A tight budget will need to be set, with costs closely monitored.

Personally, I look forward to carrying out the role as treasurer again in the up and coming year having had a year to "sample" of what is required. I have some ideas which will help cutting costs/generating income and looking forward to putting in place. Also, if there is anyone who has any ideas/or what like to help in some way, I would be open to suggestions. As we are all in this together and it is not just a responsibility of the committee.

COACHES REPORT

This season we had better results than the 2017/2018 season with two sides making finals and two coming away with the goodies.

For the Firsts it was a up and down season again with injuries, players out of form, and not batting the full volume overs to make competitive scores. We did have some small highlights with Daniel Baker scoring a century against Wembley and Ashley Forde bowling consistently all season.

The Twos struggled for most of the season but to the credit of Captain Sheamus Byrne and the young team, they can hold their heads high. One Highlight was Shaemus' bowling figures (7/39) against Balcatta.

The Thirds had a Stella year with them making it through to the Semi Final against Wembley, but unfortunately not progressing any further despite scoring a total of 244 runs to defend with Ian Cooper making 147 not out. He also made another century of 146 not out against Tuart Hill in Round 5. Another great innings during the season was from Eddie Swan who made 140 against Wembley Districts. The Thirds was well lead by First Time Captain James Birbeck, a great effort.

With the Fourths, what a season to make the Grand Final and more importantly what a win against Freo Mosman Park. Batting first and only making 113 runs and then to defend it by bowling FMP out for 102 runs, the side was well lead with Stuart Kaschula taking 7/40 off 21.5(8 maidens), backed up by Ryan Rollason 1/16 off 17 (9 maidens) and Stephen Aspinall 2/21 off 19 (6 maidens)

The side was well lead by their Captain Matt "Patty Cash" Scales, through the final and through out the season as well.

Another Highlight for the Fourths was the innings of Adam Hankins who made 132 not out against Bentley and Josh Dawson 128 against Whitfords.

The Fifths who were well lead by their captain Tristram Fletcher were in and out of games all year, but tried diligently to the end with 4 wins for the season, also bringing some juniors through such as Seb Woods and Ryan Rollason whom both ended their season playing finals at higher grades.

The One day ones also had a season to forget, only winning 6 games for the season, but still had a lot of fun and banter along the way, especially after every Thursday training. Well done to Gus for his 106 against Swanbourne.

For the Colts it was a fantastic result Winning the 2018/2019 Grand Final against South Perth after such a disappointing 2017/2018 season. They batted first making a total of 136, with Will Dagg making 41 and James Courtney-Bennett 33. The Redleg's got off to a great start with Will Dagg taking 4/11 off his 4 overs, but the game wasn't over till the last over and the Boys held on to take the win by one run.

I'd like to pay tribute to Daniel Baker who missed out on the Grand Final due to him kissing bark but he took control of the colts from the start of the season and with great results, he also had great support from Will Dagg and Matthew Edwards..

Well done to both ladies teams this year on their efforts, great to see new players coming through, Great efforts by Jack and Scott and all the other helpers for the ladies team.

Now I would like to thank all Redleg's players who represented the club for this season, also many thanks to the boys who helped out at training as sometimes I was late or could not get there.

Special mention to Kylie Bain whom was never afraid to help out at anytime whether it was at Bert Jeffery's doing the afternoon teas or back at the club room helping the Legend Muzza with dinners. As well helping a cripple for 6 weeks who wasn't allowed to drive.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP

Brad Weir was given the great honour to bestow the clubs 17th life member to Al Field below is his speech .

I'm here to speak about the induction of our 17th "Life member" in this the 44th year of the clubs existence, which is significant because it goes to show that Life Memberships are not handed out willy-nilly or light heartedly, actually it's been 5 years since the last inductee which was Angus Castley.

Some of you may not be aware Life Membership is the highest award that can be bestowed upon anyone at the club, and is historically awarded to members who have done a mountain of work not only on Committees, but also behind the scenes and displayed passion and commitment over a long period of time.

So this person first arrived at the club 28 years ago in the 91/92 season along with some Applecross high school mates who had graduated the previous year.

Like most of his mates he started down the grades, he'd rock up in his Mustard coloured Combi van, probably nursing a hangover but clearly a keen contributor with considerable skills, particularly with the ball in hand.

In just his 3rd season he put his hand up to be on the committee in the same year that he snared over 30 wickets in our 3rd XI.

In somewhat of a chalk-and-cheese season, in 94/95 he won the award of Best and Fairest in the 3rd XI and also took out the Wood Duck award for Spewing black Sambuca over himself in bed on the club trip in Fairbridge.

His on-field achievements make for very good reading, too many to list actually. He is a "Sir" 3 times over, twice for taking 7 wickets in an Innings, and he top scored with 114 not out in 2001/02.

3 times he's taken more than 30 wickets in a season bowling late hooping in-swingers.

With the Bat, he was the master of cow corner hitting which was evident in 2001 where he and Bruce Calder put on 195 runs in only 20 overs which is still a club and association record to this day for that grade.

In recent years he has won more Best and Fairest awards and Captained teams in 2 seasons.

If not for his 10 year hiatus from ACC in the UK between 2002 and 2011 he would have clocked up his 100th game long before he did as member number 51 in 2016/17.

Off the field, his contributions and achievements are also too long to fully explain here tonight, but I've done my best to condense them.

Between 1993 and now he has served on 9 ACC committees.

He served as Vice Prez in 2011/12 which was as soon as he returned from the UK.

The following year in 2012/13 he stepped up to the roll of President and was instrumental in overseeing the club in securing only our second WASCA Club Championship and first WASTCA Spirit of the game award.

He was recognised as Best clubman in 2011/12.

In 2017/18 he was inducted into the ACC Hall of Fame and in just this past season he served as Vice President. Some of the work he does is plain to see for all, however a large chunk he does behind the scenes and he's done this for years.

At a time when it appeared inevitable that the Club would become strictly a hard-Wicket Club, his work was critical in securing Turf at Burt Jeffery. His tireless work with the council and positive never-say-die attitude combined with outstanding organizational skills has resulted in the Club remaining a formidable force in the association with a bright future.

Clearly his passion and pride in the ACC is immense.

His love for the game and everyone he's met through ACC is plain to see for all. If there was an award for the clubs most popular person, I think he would be a perennial winner. He's always the first to welcome new comers to the club, a true people's person and all round great guy.

I'm sure you all agree he is an extremely worthy Life Member inductee.

Season 2018/2019 started similarly to the previous season, with great promise.

We won three out of our first four games, two of those victories being against eventual finalists Curtin Vic Park Cricket Club and perennial finalists Murdoch University Melville.

The victories against Curtin Vic Park and Murdoch Melville came on the back of some good bowling where we contained them to 145 and 141 respectively.

Likewise we bowled Tuart Hill out for 135.

Unfortunately after that time we struggled to contain sides and our batting was inconsistent.

We struggled to hit the required par scores of 200 and even on the occasions when we did we still seemed to get smashed.

In a game at Winthrop Park against Tuart Hill batting first we hit 203 but Tuart Hill managed to chase that score down with 8 wickets and 4.2 overs to spare.

We then experienced a terrible run leading into Christmas where we played Murdoch University Melville and were bowled out for 106, Western Suburbs where we bowled them out in 25.4 overs (but they had managed to score 183 runs) and we were bowled out for 93 and then a further game against Murdoch University Melville at Winthrop where we were bowled out for 99. At least in that game we bowled particularly well to keep them out there for 28.3 overs and take six wickets in what was a very tight match. Christmas and the associated break could not come quickly enough for us.

Unfortunately first game back whilst we put 163 runs on the board against Western Suburbs they managed to chase that score down with 9 wickets in hand and over 10 overs to spare.

We had slid down the ladder but amazingly we were still a chance of making finals at this point in time.

Our finest victory came in round 12 at Wembley Sports Park against Wembley Districts, who eventually won the flag.

Wembley Districts are nothing if not arrogant and in this game on a 40 degree day insisted that we play a full 40 overs and that they bat first. Mitch Hogan put in a fine performance making 88 runs to go with his 3 wickets. He featured in a 64 run partnership with Bruce Calder who made an excellent 24 which even though he scored two half centuries over the course of the year was, in my view, probably his finest performance for the year. We won the game and that was to be our best win for the season.

The following week we played Swanbourne and managed another win and all of a sudden we were on a roll and eyeing off finals again.

Unfortunately a loss to Subiaco Marist where we failed to defend 195, the following week in what was, at times, a spiteful game really cost us. We welcomed another debutant with a big future in the form of Chopper (Reid Klopper) who played with a stinking hangover but still frightened a number of their batsmen with his pace.

A late season washout against Subiaco Marist was also costly and we ended up finishing in the relegation zone (7th out of 8 teams).

Whilst the outcome of the season was disappointing it was as it always is a very enjoyable year.

Our record was 18 games, 6 wins and 11 losses with one draw (the aforementioned washout). We were only one and a half games behind 5th.

We had welcomed some new blood to the side in Mitch Hogan who unfortunately could only get on the pad-dock three or four times during the year. We would love to see more of Mitch next year.

We also welcomed up Nutsy O'Hara and anyone who says an old dog can't be taught new tricks should have seen his left arm finger spin bowling over the course of the year.

He rarely got hit for runs, generally landed on the hanky and was also an excellent pair of catching hands around the ground.

Our most successful bowler for the year was Anthony Brennan who played in 11 matches and took 19 wickets at an average of 17.47 with best figures of 3/20 and an economy rate of 4.2.

Our next best was Rocket Eade playing 14 games for the year and finishing with 14 wickets. His best figures were 3/31 at an average of 34.21 and an economy rate of 5.44.

Our most miserly bowler over the course of the year was Rob Wilton who managed to bowl full and outside off stump consistently. His 12 matches produced 11 wickets for 227 runs with best figures of 3/20 but most importantly an economy rate of 3.29.

Batting wise I managed to be the leading run scorer with 435 runs at an average of 29 with a lucky ton against Swanbourne late in the year. Our next best batsman was the ever consistent Matthew Campbell with 284 runs at an average of 21.85.
