

President's Report

There is no doubt that the forthcoming season will see Applecross Cricket Club come of age as a vigorous professional club which will be among top achievers of the competition. We have all the ingredients for success. Two of our three sides (4th and 7th) have been promoted and they should do well in their higher grades. We should have more talented and experienced sixth grade this year and I am confident that they will be in the final four at the end of this season.

In terms of equipment, we have purchased a new kit bag, gloves, helmets, a large stock of balls, new pad and new wicket keeping gloves and we have repaired all the bats.

As well, we have arranged for caps to be available with a new A.C.C. logo. Club jumpers in Applecross colours are available and we have ordered logos to go on shirts and jumpers. We expect them to be available shortly.

We now have the use of three practice wickets at Shirley Strickland Oval and the Council has provided the finance for a further practice wicket to be built in the hollow to the south-west of the Clubrooms. Hopefully, next year they will provide two more practice wickets.

The advantage of having a practice wicket in the hollow is that batsmen waiting to go in will be able to see the game whilst practising, and be ready to go in. This was not possible where our other three nets are situated.

We have also secured the services of some excellent new and old players this year. It is great to see our ranks reinforced by talented players such as Eric Taylor and Darryl Preedy.

This season has also seen us finally obtain a home. We have been admitted on a trial basis to the Applecross Sportsmans Association and we have taken formal control of the bar and clubrooms. The A.S.A. is monitoring our bar takings and we are hopeful for a fair percentage of the total profits at the end of the financial year. Separate changrooms and showers will be available for our team and visitors. Shirley Strickland will be in use for every fixture.

Many of the sixth side games will be on Heathcote Oval although some will be at Mandala Reserve and Shirley Strickland Oval. Mandala Reserve will be the main ground for 7th grade, but they will also be playing on Shirley Strickland and Heathcote Ovals.

We are one of the very few clubs in the W.A.S.T.C.A. who have a ground per side. Heathcote Oval is available on the basis of making available to Heathcote second side one of our kits on Sundays. A number of A.C.C. players will also play for Heathcote.

Socially we have a full calendar for this year. Club members are urged to keep themselves informed of our functions and to come along to support the club.


Financially we appear to be presently in a better position than we have ever been before. An early raffle helped us to start the year off well and we were fortunate that last year's committee was able to make a profit.

Since then, we have received numerous inputs, including \$581 from the Quiz Night. A special thanks to Mike Johnson for acting as Quizmaster. Committee members all agreed to pay their subs by the end of August to ensure we were financially sound to meet equipment costs at the beginning of this year. Much to the surprise of Meulemans Sports Stores, we were able to pay our first bills as soo as it was received. We have also secured a Patron. Mark Donovan has agreed to be a patron for the club and had donated \$200 to the club for this season. We are still anxious to obtain further patrons and sponsorship. We are also grateful to Paul DiGiorgio of Pizza Napoli, Applecross, for his donation of a pizza per match for a man of the match award.

There is a refreshing sense of enthusiasm and purpose in the Club this season and I hope to see the results of our determination to win not only at the end of the season, but after the one-day game on October 10. Lets notch up our first 3 victories on Saturday, 10th October.







The Greatest Test Match

The Australian team that toured England in 1882 played only one test. It was played at the Oval, and completed in only two days, 28 and 29 August. It was the ninth test match between the two counties — the

most famous test match of all.

Australia were first bowled out for 63 in 21/4 hours by the left-handers Barlow and Peate on a pitch which had absorbed two days' rain. In England's reply, Spofforth bowled Grace for four, and six wickets fell before a lead was obtained. Spofforth, "The Demon", took 7 for 46, and bowled with fire and guile. England totalled 101, a lead of 38.

On the second day, with the ground wet after further downpours, Massie and Bannerman began the task of putting Australia back into the match. Bannerman was all vigilance, while Massie played one of the great innings of test cricket. He hurled his bat at every ball the slightest loose, and his hits

crashed ponderously to the boundary.

With Australia leading by 28, Massie was blowled by a break-back from Steele. The crowd, much relieved, roared with admiration for Massie. His innings was worth 55, made out of 66 in less than an hour. Bannerman made 13 and Murdoch 29, but noone else reached double figures, and Australia's total of 122 left England a mere 85 to win. Peate took 4 for 40 finishing the match with 8 wickets.

During Australia's innings, the youngster Sammy Jones was run out by W.G. Grace, while he was attending to a divot in the pitch. This immoral action did nothing to reduce the grim if seemingly farfetched

determination of the Australians.

At 3.45 p.m. Grace and Hornby walked out to begin the most tense and dramatic innings in Anglo-Australian cricket history. They began confidently, and the crowd relaxed. However, with the score at 15, Spofforth uprooted Hornby's off stump, and with his next ball clean bowled Barlow. George Ulyett came to the wicket, and the runs began to flow. The fifty came up, and the crowd of 20,000 were convinced the match was all over. With the score at 51, Spofforth and Ulyett caught being by Blackham. Lucas joined Grace, and 2 runs later WG was caught at mid-off off Boyle. Australia was in with a chance.

Lyttelton, the wicket-keeper, joined Lucas, and, in almost total silence, the match fell into an eerie stalemate. The crowd groaned as the batsman played out over after over. After 12 successive maidens, a deliverate misfield got Lyttelton opposite Spofforth. and he was bowled by Australia's master fast bowler. Five for 66.

Lucas hit a four, then A.G. Steel was caught and bowled Spofforth for a duck. 70 for 6. "Incredible" say 20,000 people in dismal unison. Barnes hit a two, 13 to win. Blackham amazingly allowed byes, and the crowd roared as Lucas and Barnes ran 3. The next ball by Spofforth was smothered by Lucas, but the ball rolled onto the wicket and disturbed a bail. England 75 for 8. Barnes was caught off his glove off Boyle's bowling. 75 for 9.

Last man Peate jointed C.T. accomplished batsman who had been kept back to number 10. Peate swung wildly at Boyle and scored 2. He tried again next ball, and was bowled. England, all

out 77, Australia won by 7 runs.

Spofforth was chaired off the ground. Only Bob Massie in 1972 had surpassed his figures for 14 for 90 for Australia in a test against England. "The Demon" was chiefly responsible for the upset win, but credit must also go to the great innings from H.H. Massie. He made possible by his strength and audacity a victory that was to be celebrated in prose and verse for decades to come.

Following England's defeat, the "Sporting Times" published a mock obituary of English cricket. It concluded "The body will be cremated and the ashes taken to Australia". This notice was to have unforeseen widespread effect. Following the third test of the next series (Sydney 1883 — England won by 69 runs), some Melbourne ladies burnt a bail, sealed it in an urn, and presented it to the England captain, the Hon. Ivo Bligh. Lord Darnley (as he became) who died in 1927, bequeathed the ashes to Lord's, where they now remain as an eternal symbol of England v Australia competition.

Through the extraordinary contest at the Oval in

1882, The Ashes were born.






